For visualization a large draft.


Acrylics, pigments, stardust and impact metal on paper 195 x 240 cm.

The draft, in the studio, here as a landscape format


The draft as portrait format in the living room. The wood has an influence on the colour scheme.



One aims for a center of composition to the left of the axis of symmetry and determines an elegant portrait format that will enrich the architecture. The yet to be developed oil painting should have the dimensions of $175 \times 240 \times 5$ cm and will be installed 50 cm from the floor, more towards the left side.

Sabeth Holland works either on the floor or in landscape or portrait format on the wall.


For the painting on canvas (made of cotton) Sabeth Holland uses oils, pigments, 22 carat gold, acrylics and some stardust. Layer upon layer she creates the composition slowly, taking her time.





What looks black is mixed from browns, earth tones, rose madder, Prussian blue and phthalocyanine green. The colour black is used exclusively for small, selected interventions. As a result, the surface in the dark areas has a velvety texture that shimmers in multiple facets.











Ready for transportation.




Rural tradition, nature and local crafts.




Cooking, eating, living, being.

After the tension of the past months, the long creative phase, fulfillment and joy set in.

The artist beams with joy.

Magical Rings, a commissioned art project.

Art in architecture. The commission, a large painting on canvas. It should fit into the context and yet be standing out for itself, showing off the visual language, the colours and the gold that are so characteristic of Sabeth Holland. She listens carefully. Has a close look. Develops a feel for her clients.

An exchange unfolds. First ideas are outlined. A mutual goal fixed. Soon the artist sets the title. The basis for discussion is the project sketch on paper, which was kept a fraction larger than the oil painting, then still to be created. The draft was important, made the communication clear. Some facts were recorded in writing. Everything quite uncomplicated but still clear. Wishes became tangible. Necessities stood out. They were all allowed to flow in and were given time and space. — The artist aims for an open end to the project.

Should the clients not be thrilled with the result, then there would be a plan B. However, this plan never came into question at all, because with every contact it became more and more noticeable that everyone involved was pleased with the development of the work. When finished, Sabeth Holland wrote in her dedication on the back of the painting:"...Magical Rings brings harmony." - And that is exactly what happened. When the painting was finally installed in the living area, it seemed as if it had always been there. And maybe it had. An artist is able to make visible what is hidden from others. Time will tell what worlds rich in content are yet to be revealed. Magical Rings already began to unveil its story.

Sabeth Holland would like to thank her highly valued clients Brigitte and Stefan Lüchinger from the bottom of her heart for their openness, their trust and their friendship. What started many years ago as an idea, as a "glimpse", has now been implemented, is born, created, has become visible. This project involved much more than determining art as a painting for a given wall. For the involved it was all about feelings, emotions, contents, needs and their awareness of skills and competences.

And finally a last interesting fact: For Sabeth Holland, every one of her works is a form of commission. Only this time it was not the artist herself who defined it, but an art-loving, very warm-hearted couple with ideas that set new standards.
